CONVENTION 2019 — COOPERSTOWN, NY

The glow of inspiration inside the Otesaga Hotel over-rode the delayed spring outside the hotel. Despite the snow, rain, fog and generally cold temperatures, the warmth of the members and the zeal of the speakers carried the weekend.

Women Leaders: Facing the Future Together was the theme of the 2019 AAUW-NYS Convention in Cooperstown.

From the welcoming by Cooperstown Mayor Ellen Tillapaugh to closing speaker Kate Brownell, an honoree in the National Baseball Hall Of Fame, this theme was roundly covered. Of concern in all sessions were the Equal Rights Amendment, equal pay, and increasing membership in the AAUW organization. **LAF Keynote Speaker:** Paul Thein shared his story of sacrifice and dedication to the cause of sexual harassment. Thein was a VP in a community college and was

told of impropriety in the hiring of a coach and also witnessed sexual harassment of a student on campus. He took his concerns to administration and as a result lost his job, his house, and a fine reputation, mak-

ing re-employment difficult. 12 painful years later the suit against the college was resolved.

NY Kids Matter provides legal aid to victims of sexual harassment. The Child Victims Act is now part of NY state law as a result of her activism. Do colleges and universities strive to brainwash or indoctrinate our young people? by Marian Deutschman



As a young college stua book entitled "Brainwashed: How Universities Indoctrinate America's Youth."

He claimed that "there's only one view allowed on most college campuses: a rabid brand of liberalism that must be swallowed hook, line, and sinker." Shapiro said that "leftists dominate the universities--from the administration to the student government, from the professors to the student media, using their power to mold impressionable minds." He further stated that "they indoctrinate students to become socialists, atheists, race-baiters, and narcissists." Not everyone shares Shapiro's extreme conservative views but there are many supporters of variations of his position. How did those of us who went to college survive this onslaught? Or have colleges and universities changed since some of us were in school?

Are schools brainwashing instead of educating our young people? Are conservative ideas censored? Is healthy discourse stifled? Are conservative professors severely outnumbered because search committees of liberal faculty members tend to hire new faculty who share their views?

The three most liberal colleges in the United States, according to the Princeton Review in 2017, are Sarah Lawrence College, Bennington College, and Marlboro College. The listings are based on students' answers to the survey question: "Politically, are you: left-wing, Democrat, middle, Republican, right-wing?" The schools pegged to have the most conservative student bodies are more likely to stay on that list in future years, while the most liberal school one year may not even be listed the next.

Some claim that the best universities such as Harvard, dent, Ben Shapiro wrote Yale, Princeton, MIT, and Stanford, are bastions of liberalism while the most conservative universities such as Oral Roberts, Liberty College and other right wing colleges are not academically recognized at the same level with much lower admission requirements and job placement statistics. Why do leading Conservative commentators like Beck, Hannity, and Rush lack college degrees? How do conservatives defend this? Did you know that the Koch brothers have funded a very conservative curriculum at George Mason University? Is it possible that what we learn in college may depend on who pays for it?

> Although parents may not admit it, they raised children in a place where they were surrounded by people similar to themselves. A college education should help us to form our opinions from many sources and political persuasions, and use logic to decide what is best or correct. It is an opportunity to learn from, and about, many different people with different wants and needs. It is a time to challenge one way of thinking. It should make you curious about the world and about people unlike yourself. It should foster caring for this country and its citizens. It should make our children more tolerant of others than the generations of their parents and grandparents.

> In college, you may be surrounded by people from other parts of the country and by people from other countries, people with different political systems and religious practices and beliefs and customs. We learn to accept that our way of life that we've grown up with isn't the only way of life in the world. Because of that, we're more open to one another. That may be the reason we appear to be more liberal than conservative, at least for the time we are at a college or university and while we're learning, challenging, and growing.
