PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

THIS could happen to YOU!

There are surely enough things to worry about in the world these days (see Marian Deutschman's column if you need convincing!) but the opioid issue certainly needs to be near the top of the list. When our law enforcement officers and medical professionals are both part of the problem and victims of the crisis, where do we get solutions?

About a year and a half ago, this widespread issue hit home for me. Our older grandson was admitted to their local (Florida) hospital, having been diagnosed with Stevens-Johnson syndrome, which I had never heard of. It turns out to be a horrible, painful, thankfully rare condition which requires hospitalization for an indeterminate amount of time (over three weeks in this case.) Much of the treatment is aimed at pain control, and of course, opioids are an important part of that. My first thought, when told that Cole (our grandson) had been on oxycodone for almost a week, was to freak out. My son assured me that possible addiction was on everyone's minds, especially the doctor's, but also including our sick teenager. The teens are very attuned to the problem!

Why do I mention this? Because, although we hear a lot about the opioid problem, I suspect many of us (including me) know only what we read in the paper. In November we have a chance to hear from two people who are right in the thick of it. Dr. Gale Burstein (whom you may have heard speak briefly when we honored her at our May luncheon) is the health commissioner for Erie County, and Dr. Sarah A. Abdelsayed is an Addiction Medicine Specialist affiliated with Erie County Medical Center. Here is our chance to learn and truly be educated on this epidemic. I hope to see MANY of you there!

WOMEN ARE WATCHING AND THEY WILL BE VOTING

What's at stake in this election? Use the AAUW Action Fund's **Voter Issue Guide** on the aauw.org website to find out. This handout provides concise information about key policy issues in the election, including the gender pay gap, family leave and paid sick days, college affordability, campus sexual violence, and reproductive rights. The guide even includes questions to ask candidates. That's one

source of information. Take the time to search other sources on other issues of interest to you.

Research shows that a lack of information on the candidates and a lack of policy debates on issues of importance are the main reasons some women don't participate in the election process.

Between now and Election Day, the

AAUW website suggests that we start conversations about the issues that affect our families and communities. We need to ask tough questions, jumpstart the discussion, and determine where our candidates stand. The AAUW Voter Issue Guide provides nonpartisan information about the policy concerns that are critical to women and their families. Use it to prompt conversations with neighbors, family, friends, and fellow voters about what's at stake in this election. Take it to candidate forums. Consult it to develop questions to ask your candidates and your elected officials to get them on the record on the issues that matter most. Above all, make your voice heard on Election Day — and beyond.

Brett Kavanaugh's Supreme Court nomination battle could lead to an unprecedented gender gap in the 2018 midterm election vote. There is an intense partisan split over the president, a movement to expose sexual harassment and assault, and a record number of women running for office. Even before Dr. Christine Blasey Ford testified under oath that Kavanaugh sexually assaulted her, the polls showed women heavily favored Democratic congressional candidates in the Nov. 6 election. Will that last until election day?

The GOP's troubles with women are likely to hurt the party most in the battle for the House rather than the Senate. The main battlegrounds for the Senate are in Republican-leaning states where recent polling found that a majority of voters, including women, wanted Kavanaugh to be confirmed. Democrats need to take at least 23 Republican-held seats in the House to gain a majority. Many of

the most competitive races are in suburban districts with large numbers of college-educated women, a group expected to demonstrate relatively high turnout. Of the more than 250 women on congressional ballots in November, more than three-quarters of them are running as Democrats.

I'm writing this right after the Senate cast the final vote on the Supreme

Court nominee, so I'm pondering a number of questions. Since this is likely the narrowest vote for a Supreme Court nominee, it's clear that we saw some lack of support or enthusiasm for Brett Kavanaugh. Have we lost sight of "innocent until proven guilty" on the sexual assault charge? Should that uncorroborated charge have denied him this appointment? Is his lack of judicial temperament, for which he apologized, a strong indication of partisanship? Will the Supreme Court lose its legitimacy and respect for itself? Should another candidate have been nominated? There were much more serious allegations against him than those from Anita Hill against Clarence Thomas. Have we made some progress since 1991? Ford and Kavanaugh have showed us how far we have yet to go, given the response to their performances at the Senate Judicial Hearings. To quote Senator McConnell, "Each of these senators came to this process with an open mind." Do you doubt that? On October 5, the New York Times said "The country is gripped by a climate of division and distrust rivaled by few other moments in the recent past." That's why your vote and voter turnout are so important.

THE LEADERSHIP PROGRAMS FUND

Another AAUW Fund supported by the AAUW Unrestricted gifts is **THE LEADERSHIP PROGRAMS FUND.** This fund supports programs that develop women's potential to lead in their schools, their communities, and their country. One Leadership Program supported by this fund is the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders, also known as NCCWSL (pronounced NICK WHISTLE.) NCCWSL is held annually in the Washington, D.C. area and college women students who attend are given a chance to develop their leadership skills and to network with other female leaders.

The first NCCWSL conference was in 1983, when representatives from various national gender equity organizations saw the need for leadership workshops dedicated to empowering collegiate women. Since then, AAUW has taken the helm of the conference and NCCWSL was transformed into an essential experience for any woman serious about creating a meaningful impact on her campus, mobilizing her community, and preparing for personal and professional success after graduation.

Since the conference's beginnings, one highlight has been the Women of Distinction Awards ceremony and reception. This award is presented to women who:

- Exhibit leadership and pave the way for women in their fields of expertise;
- Serve as role models and/or mentors to women and girls;
- Advocate positive social change that helps to close the gender leadership gap;
- Are committed to advancing all women regardless of background;
- Give back to their field through their time, talent, and resources.

Noted women such as Emmy-winning journalist Connie Chung; NASA astronaut Mae Jemison, Ph.D.; the 43rd Treasurer of the Unites States, Rosie Rios; Olympic medalist and member of the 1996 Magnificent Seven Olympic gymnastics team Dominique Dawes; and the late civil rights activist Dorothy Height are only a few of the outstanding women who have been given this award of distinction.

The 2019 NCCWSL will be held at the University of Maryland College Park, May 29—through June 1. This conference promises to be quite outstanding and interesting. Past NCCWSL conferences featured prominent speakers such as Tarana Burke, Social Justice Activist and founder of the "Me Too" Movement; Chelsea Clinton, Vice Chair of Clinton Foundation; Sarah McBride, LGBT Rights Activist and Political Figure; Franchesca Ramsey, vlogger, comedian, host of MTV's

Decoded, Writer/Contributor; and Melissa Harris-Perry, political commentator, author, professor, and AAUW member. Truly all future female attendees should look forward to an enlightening and challenging program in 2019.

Let us remember that our donations to the unrestricted fund will help provide financial assistance to young women who would otherwise be unable to attend this conference.




