#### September 2019 Book Sale Report by Jayne Murray & Joan Kernan



It is hard to believe that Fall is upon us, which means book collecting starts anew this month! First, let us relish in the success of this year's sale and THANK the many volunteers who contributed their time and

energy! We grossed nearly \$80,000, beating out last year's total by \$68! After expenses, we expect our net total to be over \$60,000, which will go a long way to fund scholarships for young women in Western New York, in addition to supporting our own "Tech Savvy" program and fellowships at the national level.

Many thanks to Jacquie Walker for her ongoing support in publicizing our event! The Jacquie Walker Scholarship will be awarded at our Annual Fall Dinner.

Enthusiastic kudos also to our Steering Committee: Marianne Crapol, Mary Georger, Cindy Koch, Rosalind Kochmanski, Betty Preble, Roberta Travis, Jayne Murray, and Joan Kernan. Our volunteer recruiter and tireless scheduler, Judy Weidemann, has again kept meticulous track of our volunteer hours. Wrangling 160,000+ books requires commitment. Total volunteer hours were 5,248 overall (similar to last year,) with actual book sale hours reaching 1,227 (1,386 hours in 2018.) Ninety-six of our own extraordinary branch members contributed to these totals, whether it was one shift, weekly sorting, and/or shifts during the sale. Additionally, 27 nonmembers volunteered to help pre-sale and during the sale. Forty members and non-members volunteered three or more shifts at the sale!

Chuck and Nicki Drumsta have been crucial to the success of our sale for the past few years. Chuck, with his \* wife's help and blessing, has collected the recyclable books at Calvary Church throughout the year and then at the Book Sale site. This task is not easy, as the boxes of recyclable books must be moved from the basement of the Church up to a truck, driven to the recycler, and unloaded. Each load weighs in at around 6,000 lbs. Numerous trips were made throughout the year and they made at least 3 trips in U-Haul trucks from the Sale site in May alone to recycle the unsalable books. Chuck will be starting a new job in September and will be unable to collect our recyclables. We cannot thank Chuck and Nicki enough for their contribution to our book sale, their hard work, friendship, and kindness. We wish them all the best and to Chuck in his newest endeavor! THANK YOU!

If you know of anyone, any group, any company, or youth group that might be interested in collecting our

recycling, please let the Book Sale Committee know!

We had many new volunteers working the Book Sale this year. Dave Plache, whose mom, Marilyn, was a longtime AAUW member, worked his muscles with enthusiasm by moving and sorting books before and during the sale, and helped tremendously by helping to clean up the site. Thank you to Michael Kochmanski, husband of Rosalind, for renting a U-Haul and making three trips of empty boxes back to the Church after the sale! We thank the many new members of AAUW who volunteered and encourage you to continue to volunteer during the year. And of course, many husbands, grandchildren, friends, and neighbors showed up to help out. We need as many volunteers as possible, as the effort to put on our sale is very taxing on the body. **To ALL our volunteers, THANK YOU!!!**

## It's Not About Behavior, It's About Performance Dr. Marian Deutschman

Recently, I met a person who said "It's not his behavior, it's his performance" and that's why he supports the President. He chooses to overlook tweets, lies, exaggerations, narcissism, lack of integrity, support of supremacists, name-calling, separation of parents and children, etc. because the end result coincides with admirable goals. The end justifies the means definition is that a desired result is so good or important that any method, even one that is morally bad, may be used to achieve it.

Does a good outcome excuse any wrongs committed to attain it? Supporters say that morally wrong actions are sometimes necessary to achieve morally right outcomes. Actions can only be considered morally right or wrong by virtue of the morality of the outcome. Is it really a lie if it works? I asked my conservative friend to list the ends that justified the means in his mind. He said reduced

taxes, the rolling economy, cutback of regulations, getting Europeans to pay for military defense, and imposition of walls/fences/immigration controls. At one point he listed the President's negotiating skills, especially in relation to North Korea. He added "So what about how he talks? People from New York City have an abrasive style. You may be turned off by them initially but then you find you like them." If you go online you can find a list of 289 achievements attributed to this President in his first twenty months as POTUS.

How you make decisions is extremely important because there are many alternatives with dramatic impact on results, costs, time, feelings, and relationships. This President has been known to trust his intuition more than his advisors. Gut level decision processes rarely have crystal clear endings.

Attitude can be defined as "a predisposition or a tendency to respond positively or negatively towards a certain idea, object, person, or situation." This way of thinking or feeling about a person or a situation is reflected in one's behavior towards life. Your attitude is a major deciding factor for the level of success you will



enjoy. Since the 1980s Donald Trump has had an obsession with winning, with appearing tough, with tariffs, with fixing certain parts of the border, and with executive power, according to a Dartmouth professor. The President provides little evidence to support some of these obsessions.

Researchers find that the best attitude in life is the "can do" mentality. This special way of thinking and feeling about everything provides you with not only

> positivity, but also important achievements. Psychologist Carol Dweck's theory regarding one's mindset demonstrates why intelligence does not matter when speaking about individual success. She demonstrates that people either have a fixed mindset or a growthoriented one. Dweck has been studying mindsets for years and explains that people who make it in life believe success and failure are based on an innate ability (or lack

of it) and having a growth mindset.

People with a growth mindset believe that everything can be improved with their own effort. They overtake those who have a fixed mindset, even when they have a lower IQ, because they embrace each challenge and treat it as an opportunity. However, **to make good decisions we must first understand that our decisions affect many people. We need to ask ourselves, "Who and how will others be affected by the decisions I make?"** Is the President living up to his promises? Do we have a better health care system? Has he invested in the infrastructure? Has he drained the swamp? Is he facing too many investigations? Has he been unfairly criticized for the company he keeps?

My opinion is that it may be about performance, but it is also about marketing, showmanship, and targeting a base of supporters. The next few months are sure to be filled with significant unpredictability.
