"Let's teach our daughters it's not about being beautiful. Teach them to be bold. Be silly. Be strong. Be confident. Be independent and intelligent. Be brave and be fierce. Be real in a world full of fake. Let's redefine beauty."

This is one of those wonderful, unattributable quotes I like to share on Facebook. This one struck me as particularly sensitive to girls who grow up in a culture that teaches them that it is more important to be beautiful than anything else. Our daughters don't just learn it from ads on television or in magazines. They learn it from us too. When we look in the mirror and say, "I look fat today" or "I'm having a bad hair day," we are saying to our observing daughters that physical beauty is most important. When we comment on a little girl's pretty dress or pretty hair, when we let her play "dress-up" with mommy's makeup, or myriad other implicit actions, we are teaching our daughters that beauty is most important.

Let's change the cycle. Let's teach our daughters and granddaughters to be strong and intelligent. Let's teach them to speak up when the world is wrong as did the US Women's Soccer Team in their efforts to win equal pay. Let's teach them to be brave and fierce. Let beauty be another characteristic of many that make them interesting. Remember that our daughters and granddaughters are a reflection, not only of society, but of us too, and teach them by example.



GUN VIOLENCE IN THE UNITED STATES

Gun violence is a leading cause of premature deaths in the U.S. After each deadly shooting, many voices cry out for gun control, and others argue that there is no research proving those measures work. It's true that there is little research into gun violence especially compared to other causes of death in the United States. One reason for the lack of research is the Dickey Amendment.

The Dickey Amendment is a provision first inserted as a rider into the 1996 United States federal govern-

ment omnibus spending bill which mandated that "none of the funds made available for injury prevention and control at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) may be used to advocate or promote gun control." The National Rifle Association pushed for the amendment after public health researchers produced studies suggesting that having a gun in the house increased the risk of homicide and suicide. The actual amendment did not explicitly forbid research into gun-related deaths, just advocacy, but Con-

gress also lowered the CDC's budget by the exact amount it spent on such research. The NRA says that the issue of government funding to the CDC to study gun violence is something for Congress to decide and nothing has kept it from doing so.

The late Arkansas Congressman Jay Dickey, who is responsible for the amendment suppressing the CDC's gun violence research, came to regret his role. He and the CDC official that he opposed eventually favored more gun violence research. President Obama signed an executive order directing the National Institutes of Health to fund research into gun violence after the Sandy Hook shooting, but the research has not continued. Gun violence is the least researched cause of death and second-to-last (after falls) in the amount of allocated funding. In fact, gun violence received only 1.6% of the funding it should have, compared to other causes of death with similar mortality rates.

Researchers agree that there is a lack of data. Gun violence fatalities are almost equivalent to motor vehicle fatalities, yet the federal government dedicates \$240 million per year to traffic safety research and little to gun violence research. The limited gun violence research that does exist is largely funded by private sources and amounts to well under \$5 million per year.

The issue of gun violence is complex and deeply rooted in our culture, which is why many recommend that we need a public health approach to ensuring the safety

of our families and communities. Some suggest that the real cause of why we have more gun violence in America (compared to other developed nations) is because of the moral degradation of our society. Do we need moral education, not gun regulations? Is bad parenting, lack of religion, and corrupting media the cause? Are video games a damaging influence? The highest markets for video games - the Netherlands, Japan and South Korea — have the lowest gun related crime. The Swiss have

more guns per person than the United States but less mass violence.

Mental illness is no higher in the U.S. than in other countries, so it can't be the cause of our gun violence problem. There is no correlation between nations with a bullying problem and nations with gun violence problems. Austria, for example, has a bullying problem similar to ours (at around 20%) but has a much lower gun homicide and school shooting rate. The only things that set us apart among developed nations are our lax gun laws. Some conclude that gun violence is higher in the U.S., not because we are more amoral than other nations (we're not,) but because it's easier to access guns—both legally (because of lax gun regulations) and illegally (because they are so common.)

What about gun violence that does not result in death? We need to explore those statistics. We must place renewed emphasis on improving research on gun injury and violence.
