SPOTLIGHT ON MEMBERS



Judy Weidemann received the 2019 Western New York Land Conservancy Volunteer of the Year Award on September 25, 2019 during the organization's annual Gala. The purpose of the organization is "to permanently protect land with significant conservation value in Western New York for the benefit of future generations."

Judy's interest in the land conservancy began about eight years ago with the Mill Road Scenic Over-

look. From there she worked to raise \$3 million to buy 29 acres of the Stella Niagara property. That project reached its goal in 2015. Judy continues to help the land conservancy with its annual galas which are major fund raising events for the organization.

When asked about the award, Judy simply says, "It makes my heart sing to be a part of work dedicated to preserving lands like the ones I remember."

is basically responsible for ethics, loyalty, efficiency, frugality, and responsiveness to all of the people. He/She is the one everyone in the bureaucracy should look up to. Michael Siegel, author of The President as Leader, provides an analysis of the leadership skills of five recent American presidents. He identifies four leadership gualities that define presidential excellence in the White House.

First, the president should have a compelling vision for his/her presidency. For example, he notes

Ronald Reagan's vision of a smaller, less regulated government with lower taxes and less social welfare spending. Bill Clinton was serious about balancing the federal budget and reaching out to the business community, but at the same time not abandoning the needs of poor people.

Second, the president needs to have the ability to implement his/ her vision by appointing profes-

sionals (not friends) to help develop and influence policy.

Third, the president has to focus on a few major goals at a time. Jimmy Carter had a very long A-to-Z list of goals from abortion to Zaire, says Siegel. Reagan focused on three to four major goals immediately after his election and was able to get a large part of his agenda implemented.

Fourth, the president needs to understand the process and implications of decision-making. For effective decision-making, the president needs to select people who are not only "yes men and women," but are willing to challenge his thinking. It's important for a president to know the functions of each agency, and where there are points of overlap.

Siegel points out that people don't expect perfection from leaders. They expect honesty. After the Bay of Pigs disaster, President Kennedy went on national television and made a speech. Siegel quotes from it: "Ladies and gentlemen. Success has a thou-



As the face of the executive branch, the president sand fathers and failure is an orphan. I failed. Blame me." Kennedy's popularity shot way up. It's difficult to imagine hearing such an admission today. Do we have the right qualities in the current set of contenders for the presidency? Are there bright flashing lights about our current president?

> In 2017, an academic paper by a St. John's University student presented a personality-based analysis of newly elected Donald Trump's likely leadership style as president, inferred from the results of an indirect personality assessment conducted in 2015-

2016. Trump's predominant personality patterns were found to be ambitious/exploitative (a measure of narcissism) and outgoing/impulsive, infused with a *dominant/controlling* pattern and supplemented by a dauntless/adventurous tendency. Ambitious individuals are bold, competitive, and self-assured; they easily assume leadership roles, expect others to recognize their special qualities, and often act as though entitled. Out-

going individuals are dramatic attention-getters who thrive on being the center of attention, have confidence in their social abilities, tend to be impulsive and undisciplined, and become easily bored, especially when faced with repetitive or mundane tasks. Dominant individuals enjoy the power to direct others and to command obedience and respect; they are tough and unsentimental, and can be effective leaders. Dauntless individuals tend to break tradition, dislike following routine, sometimes act impulsively and irresponsibly, and tend to shade the truth and skirt the law.

Doris Kearns Goodwin, the presidential historian and author of Leadership: In Turbulent Times, said Trump lacks a long list of traits associated with effective leadership: "humility, acknowledging errors, shouldering blame and learning from mistakes, empathy, resilience, collaboration, connecting with people and controlling unproductive emotions." Where do we go from here?
