

Are all politicians Liars?

"How do you know a politician is lying? His/her lips are moving."

Back in the election time of 2012, someone named Ronald Bailey wrote, "Lying, along with a capacity for backbiting, obfuscation, and double-dealing, are, in fact, actual job qualifications for politicians."

Those in public office may take offense at this statement. However, the first duty of a politician is to get elected to office and sometimes that means that deals have to be made. Machiavelli said "when the result is good..., it will always absolve him from blame." A politician may believe that his/her good ends can justify bad

means. Are ambiguity and flexibility necessary to satisfy a wide variety of voters? Can lying, obfuscation, and doubledealing ever become so egregious that we decide to throw elected officials out of office? Is impeachment meant to address this occurrence?

Researchers have found that we all stretch the truth. It's something we learned when we were about three years old. We rationalize our lies when

they benefit us. We tell little white lies daily that make others feel good. However, experts in psychology and political science say that politicians distort the truth more often.

Psychology researcher Bella DePaulo at the University of California said, "When lies succeed, they make it more tempting to lie. They can have a lingering effect, even if they are debunked." "We're lying constantly," said Maurice Schweitzer, who studies deception and decision-making at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business, Trump's alma mater. Some lies, said Schweitzer, "fall under politeness norms and are not very harmful. There are other lies that are self-interested and those are the ones that are really harmful." They hurt relationships and trust. A loss of trust is difficult to regain after the lies are discovered. There are also costs to the liar. Deception affects the body and brain because it takes energy to create and maintain a lie.

Do people want politicians to lie to them? Our president has launched an unceasing campaign of fabrications, some simply exaggerations, others are whoppers when checked by PolitiFact. There were lurid stories about the horrors of illegal immigration. There was an unfounded claim of a million fraudulent votes in California. Then there's the story of windmills (wind turbines) causing cancer; China is paying the entirety of the cost of his tariffs on imported Chinese products; Mexico is paying for the wall, and the list goes on into thousands of lies. His popularity with his base may indicate that Americans are no longer persuadable by evidence and facts. "Dishonesty is contagious," said the University of

Nottingham's Simon Gaechter. The public tends to believe even false claims that confirm what we already believe, especially if the lies come from news sources that they already trust and agree with.

Do Democrats lie as much as Republicans? The whoppers: Bill Clinton claimed under oath that he had not had an extramarital sexual affair with Monica Lewinsky. President Obama claimed he had warned the country that certain insurance plans might get can-

celled. He had said precisely the opposite: that Americans could keep the plans they liked. Hillary Clinton lied about her e-mail scandal, possibly compromising American national security and endangering American lives. She falsely claimed to have turned over all of her workrelated e-mails and hadn't transmitted any information marked classified. These were all lies. And then there's New York State that has led the nation for corrupt government for years. Keep an eye on the Governor Cuomo's plans to reduce the state's looming \$6.1 billion deficit.

Social media makes it easier to spread misinformation. Repetition is the primary pipeline for shaping beliefs. Repetition and frequent exposure lead to familiarity and the impression that many people share an idea and agree with it. Research indicates that any repetition of misinformation, even if the purpose is to debunk, can serve to perpetuate it. Some researchers suggest that "if you want the public to believe something, just yell it louder, say it simpler, and repeat it more often than anybody else."
