Notes on our April Speaker:

Dr. Stephen Vermette is a professor of geography in the Department of Geography and Planning, SUNY Buffalo State, where he has taught meteorology/ climatology and environmental courses and mentored students for 25 years. Dr. Vermette graduated with his doctorate from McMaster University, (Hamilton, Ontario,) and he is an elected member of the American Meteorological Society. He has published numerous articles on local weather, provided local weather expertise for media outlets, and served the community with his expertise, including as a forensic meteorologist. Dr. Vermette received a commendation from the National Geographic Society for his dedicated leadership rendered to the State of New York to ensure the geographic literacy of the next generation. Dr. Vermette was also awarded the National Council for Geographic Education Distinguished Teaching Award. The Wall Street Journal referred to Dr. Vermette as a "rare climatologist," noting that he co-curated (with Tullis Johnson) a traveling art exhibition entitled "Charles E. Burchfield: Weather Event," recipient of an Award of Commendation from Museumwise. Dr. Vermette has an eclectic interest in all things related to weather/climate and the environment, especially as it relates to Western New York. He recently authored the book "The Face of WNY's Weather."

"HAVE WE LOST OUR SHARED NATIONAL IDENTITY?"

We have national holidays that celebrate patriotic symbolism and are a tribute to the founding principles of equality, liberty, and revolutionary ideals of democracy. According to an article by Ben Rhodes in The Atlantic, this is no time for passive patriotism. Our national shared identity involves telling a story about our past, present, and future. How can we save America's democratic identity? We must try to fix what is wrong and focus on what it should be to be an American.

We are a work in progress. Are we trying to form a more perfect union? Currently, we appear to be more committed to being polarized. Both patriotism and nationalism involve pride in one's country, but there is a difference. According to dictionary.com, patriotism refers to "devoted love, support, and defense of one's country; national loyalty." Nationalism also involves devotion and loyalty to one's own country but it's a policy or doctrine of asserting the interests of one's own nation as separate

from the interests of other nations or the common interests of all nations.

Novelist George Orwell said that nationalism is "the worst enemy of peace." He described it as a feeling that one's country is superior to another in all respects. Patriotism appears to be more passive, and nationalism can be more

aggressive. DifferenceBetween.net describes the difference: Patriotism is based on affection, and nationalism is rooted in rivalry and resentment. One can say that nationalism is militant by nature and patriotism is based on peace.

Have we substituted nationalism for patriotism? Are we focused on how we are better than other countries rather than how we can improve? Patriots believe in friendly relations with people all over the world as equals, while nationalism implies that only people belonging to one's own country should be considered one's equal. I'm not even sure that our polarization works to support that doctrine. A patriotic person tolerates criticism and learns from what is new, while a nationalist doesn't tolerate criticism and considers it an insult. Nationalism is often associated with a political approach in which a particular group wants to establish their beliefs as the country's official governmental policies. In our country, nationalism is most frequently associated negatively with white nationalism.

Those who identify themselves as patriots recognize the benefits of adapting, evolving, and growing as our population changes. Nationalists want to keep things the way they were as if that way was the best way. We need to recognize that past government policies and practices might have been discriminatory and wrong, and it's time to work to improve them.

A democracy is complicated. We live in a presidential democracy where the executive branch has the power. We

> elect a president to head the government. The president is kept in check by the legislative branch. Along with the judicial and legises work to maintain checks and balances, but the president has the final say. Note the difference in a parliamentary democracy where the power is given to the legislative branch through the

lative branches, the three branch-

parliament and the prime minister. The executive branch has less power.

Where do we go from here to improve what we value in our shared identity? Have we decided that leaders don't need to be elected from a group of candidates? That violence is necessary to combat opponents? That one dictator should have total control? Nationalism encourages fears of other religions, races, cultures, ethnic groups, or the LGBTQI community. This fear can be mobilized for violence. The current state of our union is disunity and division. No president can claim "mission accomplished."

In Honor of the late Stanley J. Collesano Esq.(1943-2022), Defender of the Scholarship Legacies of Olga Lindberg

Olga Lindberg was a friend of my Mother, the artist Violet Gordon. They were both proud members of the National League of American Pen Women and the American Association of University Women. They both served on the AAUW scholarship committee. Olga Lindberg left one million dollars in her will for scholarships to be split between the Western New York branches of the two organizations that help women with college educations. Unfortunately, Olga Lindberg's estate lawyer sent the donation to the national headquarters of those two organizations. Fortuitously, Lubitsa Wojno, a member of both the Pen Women and AAUW, discovered the mistake when she was in Washington, DC, at a Pen Women's meeting. The headquarters of these women's professional organizations did not want to relinquish the funds. Stanley Collesano, with the help of his wife Marguerite (a former president of our local AAUW), represented the two Western New York groups as they litigated to get the scholarship funds back

to our area. He won!! We are SO grateful.

The AAUW scholarship goes to Western New York women seeking graduate degrees. The Pen Women's scholarship, administered by the Community Foundation of Greater Buffalo, goes to young women from Western New York interested in studying writing, music, journalism, or art.

I hope that the scholarship recipients know how much they are indebted to Stanley J. Collesano, Esq., who never sent a bill to either group because he wanted as much money as possible to go to the scholarship recipients. Bravo, Stanley! Félicitions and thank you, Stanley!
