"What is Whataboutism?"

Whataboutism originated in the United Kingdom way back in the 1970s. The British define it as a technique of responding to an accusation or difficult question by making a counteraccusation or raising a different issue. The Russians perfected the technique during the Cold War. Doug Bandow, senior fellow at the Cato Institute, says it's almost impossible to discuss U. S. foreign policy without engaging in whataboutism. Bandow states the following on the Ukraine invasion, "Vladimir Putin's government bears responsibility for the terrible crime of invading Ukraine. However, American arrogance, ignorance, and

recklessness contributed to the crisis." He adds "Just imagine how Washington would have reacted to the Soviet overthrow of the Mexican government and a proposal to add the new regime to the Warsaw Pact." Lorenzo Kamel, who's a professor of history at Turin University, reminds us that "invading a sover-

eign country (Ukraine) and 'exporting democracy' are indeed two illegal and immoral sides of the same coin." It's clear that these statements deserve further discussion.

Whataboutism is a rhetorical device that involves accusing others of deeds as a way of deflecting attention from one's own offenses. Quite often, there is an element of hypocrisy that emerges when the criticism leveled at one person is an action that is taken by the critic him/herself, even with greater frequency.

You've probably done it yourself in a knee jerk reaction. Someone may make a statement about something President Biden did and you counter with a comparison of an action taken by former President Trump (that example can be reversed.) Depending on the circumstances and the willingness of both persons to explore the individual responses, it should lead to critical thinking and discussion. However, all too frequently whataboutism isn't intended to accomplish that goal. It may simply serve as an unrelated diversion and reluctance to deal with a pressing issue.

Whataboutism is a deflection process that has grown with social media in an attempt to discredit an opponent's po-

sition. It is considered a form of logical fallacy. It is easy to do and sometimes it can generate real and valuable reflection. Instead of criticizing the former president for any role in inciting the January 6 riot, some Republicans drew comparisons between the Capitol siege and the Black Lives Matter (BLM) protests. If we weren't so polarized, we could compare the similarities and differences between the BLM protests that emerged after the death of George Floyd and the protests on January 6. What are the differences? Are there similarities? Compare the motivation and methods. Was the January 6 event an attempted

coup or a breakdown in police preparation?

BLM and the failed Capitol insurrection cannot be compared, according to Cynthia Miller-Idriss, professor in the School of Public Affairs and School of Education at American University. "What happened at the Capitol, you can't call that a protest anymore," says Miller-Idriss. "That

was a riot, it was sedition, it was an insurrection, a siege... it was a domestic terrorist attack." Some BLM protests included vandalism and looting, but these events often occurred as confrontations with police after peaceful protesters left. The majority of demonstrators were peaceful, distancing from the instigators of vandalism.

The media plays a major role in highlighting and repeating variations on one story until another more newsworthy event takes precedence. The media has had an agendasetting function for years. They didn't tell us what to think but they told us what to think about. They highlighted the news of the day during regularly scheduled newscasts. Today, technology has given us 24/7 news and it's presented as breaking news even when it isn't. With misinformation, disinformation, and opinions presented as news, it's easier to practice whataboutism with sound bites from our "trusted" sources.

We must recognize that some *whataboutism* reflects a lack of personal responsibility, a lack of willingness to apologize, and a technique to dodge accountability and further critical discussion.
