Labeling, Marketing, Division & Politics

More than 81 million people voted for Joe Biden, compared with more than 74 million for Donald Trump in the 2020 election. Biden won with 306 electoral votes to 232 for Trump. According to Sarah Longwell, executive director of Republican Accountability Project, publisher of *The Bulwark, some* 35 percent of Americans—including 68 percent of Republicans <u>believe</u> the perpetuated Big Lie about fraud in the 2020 election. There are questions

regarding the January 6 attack on the Capitol, some calling it an attempted coup, and others say it was simply a riot that got out of control. According to an NPR/Ipsos poll in January 2022, a year after the event, 70% of poll respondents agree that the country is in crisis and at risk of failing. What accounts for these extreme differences in perceptions? Polarization and labeling cause division, discourage negotiation, and reject seeing the opposing side.

The June 2022 issue of *Consumer Reports* has a challenge on its cover, *"Boost Your Brain Power at Any Age."* It suggests a variety of ways to preserve and improve thinking skills. One of the recommendations is to **make learning a lifelong pursuit.** We are surrounded by challenging questions that deserve exploration to challenge the mind. If our democracy is at risk of failing, shouldn't we be taking action to avoid such a crisis?

Examine your sources of information. Are you a victim of habit, listening to the same radio stations, TV news channels, newspapers, magazines and social media? Have you checked the media bias chart (see https://adfontesmedia.com/) online to determine the truth, accuracy, and bias of your media sources?

We could begin with an acknowledgement that we are a target market, a specific, well-defined segment of consumers that an organization targets with its messaging, usually to buy its products and services, but also to promote its ideas. Target marketing tailors various components of the marketing function toward a single group, maximizing the appeal to specific markets. The term "target audience" is narrower and more specifically defined than a target market. A target audience is a group of people identified as likely consumers. The more that is known about that target audience, the more likely that the customized message will appeal to that target.


Algorithms have been used successfully by advertisers for a long time (look around you and ask yourself why you bought a particular item). Algorithms help marketers

> and persuaders use consumer-specific information such as demographics, previous behavior, and consumer choices to craft customized messages. They help companies track customers, cross-sell to them, and promote products. Algorithms are used on social media to sort content in a user's feed. Because there is so much content available, social networks prioritize content they think a user will like, based on a number of factors.

Marketing can divide groups into opposing factions. The factions need not be

polarized but that has happened by choice or design in our political system. Political polarization is the extent to which opinions on an issue are opposed, and the process by which this opposition increases over time. The Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, a nonpartisan international affairs think tank, suggests you think about doing the following: If partisanship is equated with patriotism, then destroying the other side becomes the goal, which leads to democracies falling apart. Declare yourself against hateful, polarizing speech. You may criticize your own group to reinforce what is acceptable. Avoid bad jokes. Make social media kinder. Provide real information to overturn polarized beliefs. Remind people that there is a range of opinions even within each side of a complex issue. Promote empathy to reduce prejudice. Avoid repeating false information even if the goal is to debunk it. And then I add, make learning a lifelong pursuit.

Democracies erode slowly in barely visible steps according to Steven Levitsky & Daniel Ziblatt, the authors of *How Democracies Die*. We must learn from other countries to see the warning signs.
