### Are Biden and Trump too old to run for President of the United States?

"No, not old. He's incompetent," former President Trump said, referring to President Biden, when asked whether Americans are right to be concerned about the age of the candidates. "I have friends that are in their 90s and they're sharp as a tack. I would say just about what they used to be," Trump added. A look at the polls show that his response is no surprise.

Trump, 77, is running for president in 2024, and polling shows he's likely to face a rematch against Biden, 80, in the general election. If elected, Trump would end his term well into his 80s. Biden was the oldest presidential winner ever, when he won in 2020. Since Trump is just three years younger than Biden, why isn't he facing the same scrutiny for his age? "Trump has moved with the times and Biden has not. Trump is more into social media," said a 56-year-old Trump supporter.

My yoga instructor at the YMCA said that Biden's walk gives his age away. He should move his arms more normally, she suggested. Biden has stuttered since he was a child. Even his supporters say they hold their

breath when he speaks for fear of an error that will get media attention and add credibility to the concerns about his age. Remember the claim Trump made about an IQ test that he aced? It was a test to determine cognitive impairment.

Most voters say they would like to see much younger candidates running for this very demanding job.

Senator Mitt Romney has decided not to seek reelection to the Senate. He said that "it's time for a new generation of candidates." Senator Diane Feinstein will not seek reelection but concerns about her health and age have led others to recommend resignation. Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell appeared unable to respond to reporters' questions at several press events when he froze.

According to a BBC News *Review of the Literature by Pamela Meadows, How Aging Affects Your Ability,* a person's job performance does not necessarily suffer just because a person gets older. However, "Aging is most likely to affect job performance if job tasks require sensory perception, selective attention, working memory,

information processing, rapid reaction or physical strength. There appears to be some correlation between diminished job performance and age with respect to certain job tasks."

People tend to lose their hearing as they age. Since communication is an important skill on most jobs, hearing problems can have a negative effect on performance. Older people may have trouble seeing the very small print on computers or have difficulty reading emails, newsletters or other research materials. Hence, a person with vision problems may have difficulty keeping up with the workload, as reading and comprehension would be impaired in this situation. People lose bone mass and muscle strength when they get older. Some positions require a lot of physical stamina and energy.

According to BBC News, anxiety tends to increase with age. Consequently, aging may affect job performance, particularly in high-pressure jobs with heavy demands, such as when engaged in numerous daily tasks at the same time, with a number of key re-

sponsibilities, including meeting deadlines. Such a schedule may be too much for an older worker, who may not be able to handle the pressure.

Age can also affect a person's memory. Thus, older people may have trouble in jobs that require them to memorize facts, and then recite them back rapidly. Aging individuals may need to memorize numerous aspects of an issue to develop a decision and they may have more difficulty memorizing technical data. As a result, he or she might be slower with developing the best decisions.

The most common HR selection technique, according to the Society of Human Resource Management, is the interview. Since unstructured interviews usually have no way to predict job performance, HR personnel employ alternative selection techniques for hiring and assessing potential candidates. The selection techniques we use to elect our decision makers in our democratic republic must ultimately match the knowledge, skills and abilities required of a candidate to perform a job and then, do we have a good performance measurement system? One that is free of political tribalism?


### Join us to sort donations: Tuesdays & Wednesdays, 9 a.m.-1 p.m.
