Israel and Palestine

Israeli Troops Encircle Gaza City as Global Criticism of Strikes Mounts An Israeli military spokesman said that Israeli soldiers had surrounded Gaza's largest city. White House officials said they would urge Israel to "pause" its bombardment on humanitarian grounds. This statement preceded an article in the New York Times on Nov. 3. Hamas attacked Israel with a barrage of rockets from Gaza on October 7, 2023 followed by armed terrorists who targeted civilians, including children, with brutal death and destruction. They took hostages. In retaliation, Israel cut off food, electricity and water supplies and bombarded the densely populated areas killing thousands of civilians including children. Each day since the attack on October 7, the Israeli/Palestinian Hamas attacks have dominated the news. Is peace possible? Is a two-state solution possible? Are you pro-Israel or pro-Palestine? Are we re-

quired to make a choice? Andrew Mitrovica, an Al Jazeera columnist, says, "It's a time for choosing. The humanitarian catastrophe unfolding in Gaza requires each of us to make a choice." Mitrovica reports that Josh Paul, a veteran State Department employee, made a choice to resign because he opposed President Biden's decision to quickly send more "lethal arms" to Israel. Paul said that Biden's action is destructive to the interests of the people on both sides. Mitrovica further reports that 800 public servants sent a letter to Ursula con der Leyen, European Union President, opposing her endorsement of Israel's war crimes in Gaza. The letter said that Gaza residents will be erased from the planet. Mitrovica claims Israel has stolen

Palestinian homes and land, brutalized generations of Palestinians in Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem, leading to this ruthless retaliation. Al Jazeera has stated that these views are the author's own. Omar Baddar, a Palestinian American political analyst, said "This idea that providing context is somehow providing sympathy for terrorism is a very frequently employed talking point by apologists for Israel's apartheid government." We want to see justice and punishment for the wrongdoers. In this situation, there may be some good and bad on both sides. Our personal connections may make it difficult to see both sides clearly. Where there is ambiguity, we seek more information, but we often choose sources that affirm what we already believe. Is there room for compromise and a peaceful solution, rather than violent retaliation that victimizes civilians and children on both sides? Does Israel have a right to retaliate? Media sources tend to lead us toward taking sides, so we need to find clarity elsewhere.

People are worried about relatives in Israel. Are rules of war being followed in this conflict? Benjamin Netanyahu, Israel's prime minister, wants no ceasefire without release of hostages. Biden wants a pause. Israelis oppose a pause. The goal of Hamas is to exterminate Israel. Israel's



goal is to replace Hamas leadership but what follows that objective? How can we have meaningful discussions with disinformation, antisemitism, and anti-Muslim bias around us? There are stereotypes and myths about Jewish people, Zionism, Judaism and Israel. The Israeli-Palestinian conflict has complex, historical roots that predate the current conflict. Twenty years after 9/11, Islamophobia still exists.

The Anti-Defamation League (ADL), the leading anti-hate organization since its founding in 1913, suggests a number of ways to have a productive conversation. First, develop guidelines and goals for the conversation. Position yourself as a learner rather than an expert. Use precise language that avoids stereotypes and myths. Avoid

comparisons to Nazism and the Holocaust. Anticipate some legitimate concerns about people's fear for safety. Avoid treating one person or group as representative of a whole nation. Anchor the conversation with information from a credible source. Allow for distinct experiences of pain and trauma for Jewish and Palestinian people from this conflict. Currently, we have over 200 boxes of books stacked in our Site at **37 Anderson Road** waiting to be sorted. We have had many donations from cherished personal libraries with some collections catalogued and carefully detailed notes included. We also have received small truckloads from local schools and a university. Two Committee members have helped to liquidate the stock of a local book dealer going out of business. This meant multiple car trips and much loading and unloading. On sorting days, people sometimes must wait for our carts to be free in order to unload the boxes from their cars. Each book is opened and checked and sorted by genre and for special qualities which could bring us extra income. We can attribute our busy days to the kind assistance of our WNY libraries in posting our We Want Books bookmarks and also the recent press in the Bee Newspapers and OlafFub Sez. We also know your word of mouth helps as often they tell us that someone has mentioned us to them or they know an AAUW member.

Last week, Barbara Condrell brought in some of her husband, Dr. Ken Condrell's, books from his collection. WNYers may recall that he wrote, *"How To Raise A Brat"* and *"How Not To Raise A Brat."* A year after his death, she has generously donated his beloved books on fly fishing, aviation, and Frank Sinatra, knowing that they would be sold to provide scholarships. However, she confided that she could not part with his treasured copies of Tarzan books. Books carry memories of those we have loved. We feel fortunate to hear these stories as we all work with books because we also love them. The AAUW Book Sale is the conduit to putting these beloved books into their next homes and also helping our WNY students pursue their higher education goals.
