QUESTION FROM YOUR NEWSLETTER EDITOR

A few years ago it was decided to send this newsletter to the members each month via email. Snail-mail was used only for members who did not have email OR who specifically requested a paper copy. This SEEMED to be working well, and the branch was enjoying some savings on printing and postage, but it has come to our attention recently that some people have not been seeing those emails. While we try to figure out the problem, we're sending this issue via postal mail to all our members AND via email to those members with an email address. We ask for your help in determining how we should move forward with YOUR delivery process!

First, though—if you have email but think you haven't received this issue that way, please check your spam/junk mail folder to see if perchance it went there (it was sent on Friday, March 22). The email would have come from either "Vertical Response" or from me. Vertical Response is the bulk email system we use, but it rejects some email addresses so I forward the message to those people. Is Our Democracy in Decline?

The United States is experiencing two forms of demo-

cratic erosion, wrote Vanessa Williamson, senior fellow in Governance Studies at the Brookings Institution. She cited examples of election manipulation and executive overreach. She noted that state legislatures have enacted laws to reduce voters' access to the ballot. They have politicized election administration and excluded electoral competition with extreme gerrymandering. Executive power has grown to a point that it threatens civil service independence. We have a hyper-partisan, gridlocked Congress and the impartiality of the judicial branch is questioned.

"If you've lost the truth, you've lost our democracy" said

John Kerry, who recently served as the first U.S. Special Presidential Envoy for Climate. He reminded us that politicians are not the best validators of the truth and this dilemma is being exploited by our enemies. John Kerry served as Secretary of State in the Obama administration.

We can conclude that this is a crucial time for truth and excellent leadership to prevent the loss of our democratic government. How important is truth in government?

"Somehow or other, we need to have acquired some very basic, shared understanding about what causes what, what's broadly desirable, what's dangerous, and how to characterize what's already happened," said Sophia Rosenfeld, Ph.D., Walter H. Annenberg Professor and chair of the Department of History at the University of Pennsylvania. Her most recent book is *Democracy and Truth: A Short History*. Our future depends on seeing, as well as living in, a shared world, she added.

Back in 2020, former President Donald Trump's leadership style was summarized in a collaborative faculty– student research program in the psychology of politics at St. John's University and the College of St. Benedict in Collegeville and St. Joseph, Minnesota. This effort was directed by Aubrey Immelman, Ph.D., associate professor of psychology, who specializes in the psychological assessment of presidential candidates and world leaders. "Trump's executive leadership style in office has been bold, competitive, and self-assured (i.e., ambitious); tough and directive (i.e., dominant); impulsive and undisciplined (i.e., outgoing); and disruptively tradition-defying, with an inclination to shade the truth and skirt the law (i.e., dauntless)."

In January 2022, President Joe Biden was assessed in an article by Megan Brenan in a Gallup publication: "President Joe Biden is viewed as likable and intelligent by three in five Americans. However, at the end of a challenging first year in office, with his approval ratings at a personal low of 40%, less than half of U.S. adults think he possesses five other positive character qualities, least of all being a strong and decisive leader (37%) and able to manage the government effectively (38%). Slightly more think he displays good judgment in a crisis (43%), is honest and trustworthy (45%), and cares about the needs of people like themselves (48%)." His approval ratings are still extremely subpar and polarized. There is hope that his strong State of the Union speech may enhance those numbers.

President Joe Biden is the oldest president in U.S. history. He will be 81 when voters cast their ballots in November. By the next Inauguration Day in January 2025, he'll be 82



years old. Should he win the 2024 presidential election, he would be 86 by the end of a second term, nearly a decade older than the second-oldest president ever, Ronald Reagan.

"The wonderful thing about America is that almost anyone can grow up to become president.

The reality is that only some people should," says William C. Becker, opinion contributor to *The Hill*.

John C. Maxwell is an internationally recognized leadership expert, speaker, coach, and author who has sold over 19 million books. Dr. Maxwell's organizations have trained more than five million leaders worldwide. Every year he speaks to Fortune 500 companies, international government leaders, and organizations as diverse as the United States Military Academy at West Point, the National Football League, and the United Nations. He is a best-selling author who has written three books, which have each sold more than one million copies: *The 21 Irrefutable Laws of Leadership, Developing the Leader within You,* and *The 21 Indispensable Qualities of a Leader*.

Maxwell maintains that leadership and effectiveness are interconnected. Real leaders develop followers, not because of their title but because they positively influence others' lives. He stresses the importance of character, relationships, knowledge, intuition, experience, past success (what you've done), and ability (what you can do). Leaders add value to others' lives by serving them. Great leaders have the lowest turnover because trust is the most crucial aspect of great leadership. It's a leader's job to generate momentum and keep it flowing. Leading well is not about enriching yourself—it's about empowering others." We need to find the right people for the right jobs.

"When the right leader and the right timing come together, incredible things happen," said Maxwell.

About our April Speaker!



Dr. Stephen Vermette is a professor of geography in the Department of Geosciences at SUNY Buffalo State, where he has taught meteorology, climatology, and environmental courses and mentored students for over 30 years. Dr. Vermette

graduated with his doctorate from McMaster University (Hamilton, Ontario). He has published numerous articles on local weather (providing local weather expertise for media outlets) and on environmental-related issues. He currently serves as a board member for the Erie County Water and Soil Conservation District. Dr. Vermette received a commendation from the National Geographic Society for his dedicated leadership rendered to the State of New York to ensure the geographic literacy of the next generation. The Wall Street Journal referred to Dr. Vermette as a "rare climatologist", noting that he co-curated (with Tullis Johnson) a traveling art exhibition entitled "Charles E. Burchfield: Weather Event" which received an Award of Commendation from Museumwise. Dr. Vermette has an eclectic interest in all things related to

weather and climate, especially as it relates to Western New York. He is currently hosting the Golden Snowball Trophy on behalf of the City of Buffalo.







Elections, Elections, Elections!

The national elections are all over the news, but that's not the only place our votes will be solicited in the next few months. We have other NYS issues—and AAUW issues!

- Early in April you will be receiving a Buffalo Branch ballot asking you to vote for new officers for the 2024-26 biennium. A single slate is being presented by the nominating committee, but write-ins will also be permitted. The slate is as follows:
 - VP Membership Recruitment, Diane O'Brien
 - Secretary/Parliamentarian, Judy Huber
 - CFO, Shirley Joy
 - EAP (Education/Program) Treasurer, Ruby Williams
 - Fundraising (Booksale) Treasurer, Jennifer Hoffman
 - Scholarship Director, Melissa White
- 2. You will also be receiving a national AAUW ballot for voting on a major, controversial issue removing the education requirement for membership in AAUW. If the measure passes, membership will be open to all who believe in the mission of AAUW. The NYS board has passed a <u>resolution</u> in favor of this change. More information is available on the "<u>Open up AAUW</u>" website.
- 3. Don't forget that a NYS constitutional amendment will be on the governmental ballot. Currently, our state constitution only protects against racial and religious discrimination. The ERA-NY would prohibit discrimination by the government based on a person's ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, and sex — including their sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes. It would also protect against any government actions that would curtail a person's reproductive autonomy or their access to reproductive health care.

The Power Of Our Book Sale

We hear many stories at our Sale of how people wait all year for our event or that they bring new generations with them. Our donors often report that they are now donating books back to us that they purchased at previous sales! Recently a donor brought in the first installment of her library and told us the story of being an AAUW Fellowship recipient herself. The Buffalo Branch has long been a supporter of this national program. As we gear up to hold our Sale, this story reminds us of our purpose.

"I would like to express my gratitude for the dissertation fellowship that AAUW granted me from July 1980-July 1981. There was no better time for me to receive the fellowship than during that period because it enabled me to work on my dissertation in a time of grief. My mother passed away too soon for my family—she was only 63 years old -- on a Friday in January 1981, three days after Ronald Reagan was inaugurated president of the United States. Upon hearing the bad news about my mother I returned home to Pittsburgh to care for my father, who was retired, until the fall when I returned to the University of Toronto to finish my dissertation. The only source of income I had that year was the fellowship. In the fall of 1983 I accepted a position as Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Ripon College, Ripon Wisconsin. I taught there for 5 years. In 1988 I was offered a position at Canisius University (then Canisius College) and have taught and done research there until the end of the spring semester 2023, when I retired after teaching for 35 years. I still teach one course a semester as an adjunct at Canisius, but I would never be in the position that I am in today if it were not for AAUW. In appreciation for the scholarship I received I have donated the books in my office to the AAUW book sale this year in the hope that other women can have the same opportunity that I had."
