Line of Presidential Succession

According to the Pew Research Center, roughly a quarter of Americans (26%) hold unfavorable views of both presidential candidates. Four out of ten adults aged 18 to 29 (41%) have an unfavorable opinion of both Biden and Trump. In comparison, three out of ten adults aged 30 to 49 and fewer than two out of ten of those aged 50 and older dislike both men.

Freelance journalist Matt Haines, in a Voice of America News article, quoted a voter who said, "Are we voting for two men who are in their 80s, or are we voting for the people they've chosen to be their vice presidents? The chance they won't be able to finish their term because of dementia, senility, or other health reasons isn't unbelievable. Something in our system is broken, and we have to fix it."

Charles Bullock III, political scientist at the University of Georgia, has claimed that "Gerrymandering has created less competitive districts." With no congressional term limits, that means you have politicians who can stay in office for decades without ever being seriously challenged. "The result is that much of our country's leadership, not just our presidential candidates, is older," he added.

If a U.S. president cannot carry out the duties of the office, the responsibilities are passed to another government leader in a specific order. The president of the United States may be replaced if he or she becomes incapacitated, dies, resigns, is unable to hold office, or is removed from office.


The U.S. Constitution and the Presidential Succession Act of 1947 outline the presidential order of succession: Vice President, Speaker of the House, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, Secretary of State, Secretary of the Treasury, Secretary of Defense, Attorney General, etc. Note that the line of succession of cabinet officers is in the order of their agencies' creation.

There's an interesting story related to how the Speaker of the House became the successor after the Vice President. "When the 1945 death of Franklin Roosevelt propelled Vice President Truman into the presidency, Truman urged placing the Speaker, as an elected representative of his district, as well as the chosen leader of the "elected representatives of the people," next in line to the vice president. Since one could make the same argument for the president pro tempore, Truman's decision may have reflected his strained relations with 78-year-old President Pro Tempore Kenneth McKellar and his warm friendship with 65-year-old House Speaker Sam Rayburn. After all, it

was in Rayburn's hideaway office, where he had gone for a late afternoon glass of bourbon." That was where Truman first learned of his own elevation to the presidency. Truman signed the Presidential Succession Act on July 18, 1947 (Senate Historical Office source).

The following candidates have been announced for vice president: Kamala Harris, incumbent vice president, is running as Biden's vice president. Nicole Shanahan, lawyer and entrepreneur, is running as Robert F. Kennedy's vice president.\* At this writing, Trump has not chosen his vice president.

Republican senators had to Google Michael Johnson when he was first mentioned for the Speaker of the House position. On October 24<sup>th</sup>, Johnson came in second out of nine candidates behind Tom Emmer of Minnesota. On social



requires unanimous support to keep his job. Because he became Speaker in the middle of a Congressional term, he doesn't have the leverage of committee appointments until after the next election. Congressman Jamie Raskin, professor of constitutional law at American University's Washington College of Law for more than 25 years, considers Johnson "by far the most constitutionally informed member of the Republican conference." When Johnson was interviewed by host Sean Hannity on Fox News he said that the Bible dictated his policy positions on "any issue under the sun." A Washington Post article by Jack Jenkins quotes the new House speaker as suggesting that he was ordained by God, "I believe that Scripture, the Bible, is very clear: that God is the one who raises up those in authority. He raised up each of you. All of us," he added, after being elected speaker in a 220-209 vote. \*Robert F. Kennedy Jr., environmental lawyer, writer, and member of the Kennedy family, announced his campaign

for the 2024 U.S. presidential election on April 19, 2023. He is known for advocating anti-vaccine misinformation and public health conspiracy theories. He initially ran for the Democratic Party nomination, but announced on October 9, 2023, that he would run as an Independent candidate.













# Why Renew Your AAUW Membership?

In June a majority of our members will be receiving membership renewal forms. The purpose of this article is to remind all why it is important to renew. We have members who have been with us from one to over 50 years! A question that comes up frequently is "Why should I renew? The dues are getting quite high!"

AAUW is a community standing strong for gender equity. <u>Your</u> membership makes our powerful voice even louder on critical issues affecting women and girls. The national organization has a nationwide network of 170,000 members and supporters, 1,000 local branches, and 800 college and university partners.

For over a century, the American Association of University Women has examined the fundamental issues of the times – educational, social, economic, and political – and has taken courageous positions, often far ahead of popular opinion. Our advocacy efforts have propelled countless new laws including the Equal Pay Act, first proposed in 1945 and finally passed in 1963; the Title IX amendment in 1972; the Family and Medical Leave Act in 1993; and the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act in 2009. Nationally we support strong laws to close the wage gap, provide paid sick time and parental leave, protect pregnant workers, curtail sexual harassment and more. We have also worked on local issues. In 1894 the newly formed local AAUW joined in the movement to better the conditions in the Buffalo schools. By 1909 the Association of Collegiate Alumnae proposed what would become the Buffalo Board of Education, with women appointed by the mayor to serve on it.

So back to the renewal question. National and NYS AAUW have increased their dues, sometimes by a lot, over the years. AAUW Buffalo has NOT! Our dues have remained the same (\$15) for many years. We carry on our missions of a well-known book sale and awarding scholarships worth thousands of dollars every year. Is it easy to tell yourself that those things are not important? That equity and equality are not important?

I will end this article with an encounter I had with a young woman about a month ago. I was explaining AAUW, our branch, our programs, etc. and why she should join. She stated there was no need! We (older) women had worked hard on getting us equality – but we have it now, so no need to continue the task!!!!!!!!

It would be great if that were true! Please renew your membership to help us follow through on the mission we all began so many years ago.

**Rhonda Frederick** retired a year ago after 43 years of working for People Inc. She was the CEO of this agency for her last nine years before retiring. As such, she has led this nonprofit health and service organization into many different areas .

Rhonda began her career as a direct support provider to disabled individuals as an entry level employee. From here she moved steadily upward in her positions.

In a recent Buffalo News article of her accomplishments, she stated," We've just done so many things that the community needed..." "We look at community needs and develop programs to meet those needs."

Rhonda's vision has helped grow People Inc. to the biggest human service provider in WNY.

People inc. began in 1970 as a human services organization for disabled individuals. A small group of parents and professionals recognized a need for programs for people with intellectual disabilities.

People Inc. now provides services to developmentally delayed individuals, families, older adults and the community. It has grown from the original 10 staff members to over 4,000 staff members today. There are now over 140 group homes for disabled individuals, with a wait list for people needing this service.

- Senior adult programs
- 19 apartments for older adults meeting certain living requirements
